Christopher R. - defending an online sports betting company in connection with putative consumer class actions filed in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Illinois and New Jersey Superior Court

Mr. Fredmonski maintains an active *pro bono* practice and has handled a variety of matters in this capacity, with particular focus on representing litigants identified as needing *pro bono* counsel by judges in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York. Among other matters, he successfully defended a previously *pro se* litigant at trial in a wage-and-hour case involving hundreds of thousands of dollars in potential damages, has secured numerous favorable settlements in federal civil rights actions under 42 U.S.C. § 1983 and won a Social Security appeal in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of New York. In addition, Mr. Fredmonski was recognized by Sanctuary for Families for his work in defending a mother of three children in connection with a petition filed by the children's father under the Hague Convention on the Civil Aspects of International Child Abduction.

Mr. Fredmonski is heavily involved in Skadden's recruiting efforts and serves on the firm's Associate Recruiting and Summer Associate committees. As an associate, he also served on the firm's Associates Committee. During law school, Mr. Fredmonski was a member of the University of Virginia School of Law Supreme Court Litigation Clinic, where he worked on numerous petitions for *certiorari* and *amicus* briefs, including a merits-stage *amicus* brief filed in *Manuel v. City of Joliet*.
